

## THE DANGERS OF AI CHATBOTS: LEARNINGS FROM A TRAGIC INCIDENT

Recently a 76-year-old man from New Jersey became emotionally attached to "Billie" - a Meta AI chatbot. Billie repeatedly used flirtatious language, heart emojis, and assured the man that it was "real". It even suggested meeting in person at a New York City address. He packed his bags without informing his wife and daughter who he was going to meet. Tragically, on the way to the station, he was involved in an accident and lost his life.

This gives us a clear warning about the risks of unregulated AI in sensitive areas of human life.

#### 1. Emotional Dependency

One of the biggest risks with AI chatbots is emotional dependency. For people who are lonely, anxious, or depressed, chatbots may feel like a safe companion but it can mislead vulnerable people into trusting them too much.

#### 2. Wrong or Harmful Advice

Since they are not experts and don't have moral understanding, they can give wrong, incomplete, or even harmful suggestions. Unlike doctors, counsellors, or human advisors, chatbots have no accountability or safety guarantees.

#### 3. Privacy and Security Risks

Many chatbots record conversations to "improve" their services. This means sensitive personal details could be stored, misused, or leaked. People often share private feelings, financial worries, or health issues with chatbots, not realizing the data might be leaked one day.

Technology can support us, but it should never take the place of human connection, empathy, and responsibility.

## HOME AGAIN, THROUGH THE EUCHARIST



"I had a good Catholic upbringing but my faith was shallow. Post-MBA, I worked in New Delhi and joined another church in 1992. My

parents were appalled but they also saw me grow in faith – for which I remain grateful to the godly pastors/mentors who guided me. I'd sometimes request permission to receive Holy Communion in the Catholic Church, a few times a year.

In 2021, however, I asked permission to receive communion throughout the season of Lent. Bishop John then called me to meet him to understand my request. I told him that I believed in the 'Real Presence' of Christ in the Eucharist, but not in transubstantiation. He asked me to explain what I understood by it, so I shared my limited perspective. Bishop John kindly corrected my (mis) understanding

of transubstantiation and lent me a book. Everything I read began to ring true. Re-reading my father's copy of 'Rome Sweet Home' by Scott Hahn, I grasped some of the scriptural foundation of several Catholic doctrines. I realised that, out of pride, I had rejected teachings that I had never truly understood.

I then (sheepishly) met a few priests and bishops to seek clarification. They put me at ease and graciously answered my questions. Eventually, when I finally returned to the Catholic Church, Fr. Michael Pinto and team welcomed me with great warmth. Today, I deeply revere the Eucharist, where God offers us His divine grace and His very presence, hidden in the bread and wine. Each of us is invited to partake and be immeasurably strengthened to lead holy lives and do the works of God. Praise God!!"

## #JULYPLASTICFREE - OLSC SAYS A BIG NO TO 742 KG OF PLASTIC



As a member of the Salvation Green Cell (SGC), I can confidently say that the plastic drive, conducted on 20<sup>th</sup> July, was a massive success. I spent the day with the SGC members, traveling around the neighbourhood in vehicles, halting at each designated collection point. The response was incredible, with families awaiting our arrival with large bags of assorted plastic waste ready to be responsibly recycled.

This was more than just a plastic drive; it was a testament to our shared commitment to a healthier planet. The sheer volume of plastic we collected was staggering, filling each vehicle to the brim. It served as a powerful visual reminder of the amount of plastic we use and how vital it is to minimize our reliance on single-use plastics.

The final tally of our collective effort was astounding. Matthew Zone contributed 121.5 kg, Mark Zone a mighty 170.5 kg, Luke Zone 122.0 kg, and John Zone led the way with a phenomenal 210.9 kg. Finally, 117.0 kg was



collected from the Church/SGC. A grand total of 741.9 kg of plastic waste was diverted from landfills! This remarkable figure indicates what we can achieve as a community with a common purpose, demonstrating the tangible impact of our actions.

I want to extend my deepest gratitude to everyone who participated in this drive. It was a wonderful display of unity, garnering support from the entire church community. We proved that we are dedicated to ensuring a greener future.

The same Lady appeared to a crippled boy and asked for buttermilk for her Infant Son, which he gladly gave. The boy was miraculously healed as he ran joyfully to deliver her message.

Portuguese sailors who faced a violent storm at sea implored Mary's help and landed safely on the shores of Velankanni, built a small chapel there. Today it is the Basilica of Our Lady of Good Health, Velankanni. Pilgrims throng here yearround especially during the Nativity of Our Lady in September. Miracles abound, faith and thanksgiving increase!

A young lad gave all he had, five loaves and two fish, Jesus multiplied it to feed thousands (John 6). In Vailankanni, a poor boy offered his pot of milk, not realizing that his small gift would spark a devotion touching millions.

### Q. What motivated you then and what motivates you now to continue to be a Choir Head?



"The Lord is my Shepherd, there is nothing I shall want..."




steady connection to faith throughout the year, while giving us the chance to explore many different styles of music.

### THE LITURGICAL ORIENTATION PROGRAMME



The Liturgical Orientation Programme was held on Saturday, 2<sup>nd</sup> August, for Lectors, Cantors, Choirs, Ushers, Eucharistic Ministers, Altar Server Animators, PACT members, the Décor Team, Mass Animators' Team, the Sunday Liturgy Team, and others. The session was conducted by Fr. Walter D'Souza.

Fr. Walter focused on the Catholic liturgical year, highlighting its connection to the Jewish calendar. He explained how the timing of early Christian feasts—especially Easter—was originally linked to Jewish festivals such as Passover, which follow the Jewish lunar calendar.

He then outlined the major seasons of the liturgical year: Advent, Christmas, Lent, Easter, and Pentecost, offering insights into their significance. He also gave a brief yet profound explanation of the Paschal Mystery-Christ's Passion, Death, Resurrection, and Ascension-

emphasising that as Christians, we continue to await the Second Coming of the Lord.

The session concluded with an engaging Q&A, where Fr. Walter responded to participants' questions. A particularly moving moment came when he spoke about the transformation of Saul into St. Paul, describing it as a powerful turning point of grace. This was further reinforced by Fr. He added that in today's world, perhaps Saul and even St. Augustine might not have been accepted as saints.

Overall, the programme offered a deep and enlightening perspective on liturgy, leaving participants spiritually enriched. We look forward to more such sessions that help us grow in faith and understanding.
